WARM was established out of necessity when the local shelter reached out to the Faith Based Community and asked for help. The first WARM season took place in November 2009. The WARM program is very successful with over 50 churches participating. WARM operates in close partnership with St. Mary's County Government and Three Oaks Center.

WARM is an interfaith non-profit organization. Churches of all backgrounds open up their doors each winter to help the homeless.
